The 7th Space Warning Squadron guards the Continental United States, Alaska, and Canada against intercontinental ballistic missiles by detecting both sea-based launches, in-flight missiles and providing mid-course interceptor guidance to eliminate threats.

Additionally, the 7th SWS radar tracks and surveils objects in low-earth orbit. The unit is a geographically separated unit of Space Delta 4, Buckley Space Force Base, Colorado.

DoD Clarification: No Termination Date Set for Legacy Retiree IDs

Although DoD officials encourage retirees holding legacy (paper-based) identification cards with indefinite expiration dates to update to the new model, they have yet to determine a termination date for the older IDs.

This is in contrast to a June retiree newsletter published by the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS), which stated all retirees had until Dec. 31, 2025, to update their cards to the Next-Generation Uniformed Services ID (USID) card before they became invalid for base access.

According to a DoD official, "It's important for





cardholders to know these older paperbased forms of ID will eventually be terminated, and will need to be replaced by the new plastic-based

USID card. This is true even if your old ID card has an INDEF expiration date on it."

The DoD official told MOAA that the old cards "may continue to be used as the Department of Defense has not determined a termination date for cards with indefinite ("INDEF") expiration dates. Military retirees and beneficiaries with legacy ID cards with INDEF expiration dates are encouraged to update their USID cards to the new Next Generation USID card at their convenience."

Other DoD resources and social media pages have also put out information citing an incorrect Dec. 31 changeover deadline, which has led to some cardholder confusion.

Beetle Bailey turns 75: the Army's Lovable Slacker Marches On

When "Beetle Bailey" debuted in 1950, it was a college strip about a lanky underachiever who wanted to do as little as possible. Six months later,

creator Mort Walker had Beetle enlist in the Army during the Korean War.

From that moment on, the reluctant private became one of the most

recognizable characters in American comics,

embodying the frustrations, absurdities and humor of military life.

September 4 marked the strip's 75th anniversary, a milestone few comics have ever reached. For the Walker family, it is both a celebration of their father's creation and a continuation of a legacy that has outlived the man who drew it for more than six decades. Mort Walker died in 2018 at age 94, but his sons Greg, Brian and Neal have kept the strip alive, publishing new gags every day since.

"It's our entire life, almost," Greg Walker said. "The strip was created soon after I was born. I've been here from the beginning. I started writing when I was in college more than 50 years ago, and it's always been a part of us."

Seventy-five years after Beetle stumbled into the Army, he is still on duty. Not because he wants to be, but because readers still want to see what he will do to get out of work tomorrow.

U.S. Coast Guard to Add Heavy Icebreaker Amid Shipbuilding Overhaul

Full production of a new polar security cutter for the U.S. Coast Guard was recently approved by the



Department of Homeland Security, as the administration seeks to boost shipbuilding and maritime security in the

increasingly competitive Arctic region.

The new vessel — the first heavy polar icebreaker to be built in the U.S. in about five decades — will be constructed by Bollinger Shipyards.

The U.S. Coast Guard currently fields a single heavy polar icebreaker, the USCGC *Polar Star*, and a single medium polar icebreaker, the USCGC *Healy*. The *Healy* was put out of action by a fire last July and the *Polar Star* is nearly five decades old.

To compensate for a dearth of existing icebreakers, the service in December purchased a commercially available light polar icebreaker — renamed the USCGC *Storis* — that became the first to be added to the service's fleet in a 25-year period.

The green light for the heavy polar icebreaker, meanwhile, comes as the U.S. military has observed a recent surge in foreign maritime activity in the Arctic region, including a joint Chinese-Russian air patrol near Alaska last summer.

Additional vessels are only one facet of sweeping changes now being introduced to the U.S. Coast Guard, which is currently being restructured according to a recently announced initiative called Force Design 2028. "We are executing transformational change to renew the Coast Guard," said Acting Commandant Adm. Kevin Lunday.

Incoming CNO Caudle Calls for New Fleet Design in First Speech

The Navy will roll out an updated fleet design that will

integrate emerging military technologies into how the service fights, newly sworn-in Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Daryl Caudle announced in his first speech as the service's top officer.



Speaking at his swearing-in ceremony at the Navy Yard in Washington, D.C., Caudle said the service is

developing the fleet design in line with how it plans to operate in the next several years.

"The way we fight today will not be the way we fight tomorrow. We will relentlessly innovate, adapt and accelerate the integration of cutting-edge technologies, artificial intelligence, robotics and autonomous systems, resilient command and control networks, hypersonic weapons, advanced manufacturing and quantum-enabled sensing," he said. "The way we fight tomorrow becomes reality with our future fleet design, a design that will be tightly coupled to the Navy warfighting concept, a newly developed Navy deterrence concept and aligned to the department's investment priorities."

Caudle, the former commander of U.S. Fleet Forces, has preached readiness as a priority for the service and the need for the Navy to do a better job of improving its maintenance backlogs. At the same time, new construction for the service's major programs like *Virginia*-class and *Columbia*-class submarines and the *Constellation*-class frigate are facing years-long delays. The Navy has been slow to develop new unmanned surface and air systems, and has made little progress on next-generation ships and aircraft.

For the last several years, the sea service has prioritized the readiness of its current force as a top priority with an eye toward a conflict with China in the Pacific that could come as early as 2027 in a plan outlined by then CNO Adm. Lisa Franchetti.
